"THE SECRET"

As a father to three inquisitive young children, I am constantly entertained and enlightened by the questions and insights they have. It will not surprise you that life can get a bit hectic in our house, and sometimes I worry that I am not giving enough love and attention to each one of them individually. Often in the midst of the chaos of our lives, one of them will sit on my lap or pull me aside and say they have a "secret" to tell me. Sometimes the secret is silly and amusing, but usually it is a simple "I love you." These secrets are my children's way of making sure that I hear exactly what they are trying to say and that I know they are there. It is during moments like this that I recognize and reflect on God's grace and love.

In the story of Psalm 16, David appears to be experiencing uncertainty and distress in his life and uses the opportunity to carve out one-on-one time with God to reaffirm his "secret." The secret in this instance is his total belief and confidence in God and his appreciation for the abundance of blessings God provides him, including the opportunity for eternal life.

I realize that feeling uncertain and overwhelmed is a normal part of life and not unique to our family. Just as my children need one-on-one time with me during the chaotic times and David needed his alone time with God, I have found it increasingly important as I have gotten older to carve out time with God to tell Him my "secret." This is my chance to make sure He knows that I am there and to reiterate my belief and trust in Him. How and when do you find it best to communicate your "secret" to God?
